

YOUR TUNA POLING ADVENTURE

WHAT: Join the historic **MFV Tacoma's Ladies Tuna Fishing Adventure** and experience the thrill of poling a Southern Bluefin Tuna onboard an 84ft wooden tuna clipper in the Southern Ocean & Great Australian Bight

We're recreating a 1950's tuna-fishing trip. You'll be using original fishing methods with live bait and bamboo poles.

WHERE: Port Lincoln, Neptune Island, places that not too far away for 3 days and 2 nights.

WHEN: Arrive at Port Lincoln and go onboard on **Friday 24th Feb** for crew training, including live baiting & night fishing with lights & nets in Boston Bay. We depart for the tuna grounds at 6.00am on Saturday weather permitting. We then spend the next day fishing for tuna & having a great life experience. Anchorages are weather dependent and could include Memory & Snug Coves. We will return to Port Lincoln on **Sunday 26th Feb.**

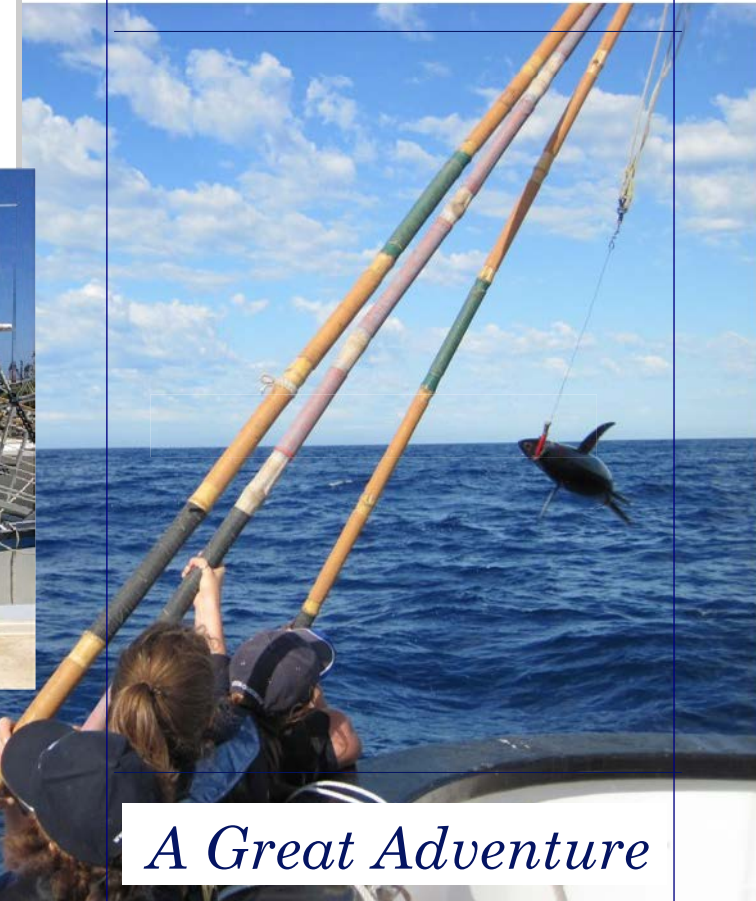
ACCOMMODATION: MFV Tacoma has 12 comfortable bunks.

MEALS: All provided and include memorable roasts from the **AGA** cooker.

CREW: There is something for everyone to do as a crew-member of the 2017 Ladies Tuna Fishing Adventure.

All poling equipment is supplied but you can bring your own favourite fishing rod & tackle.

COST: \$400 for 2 days

A Great Adventure

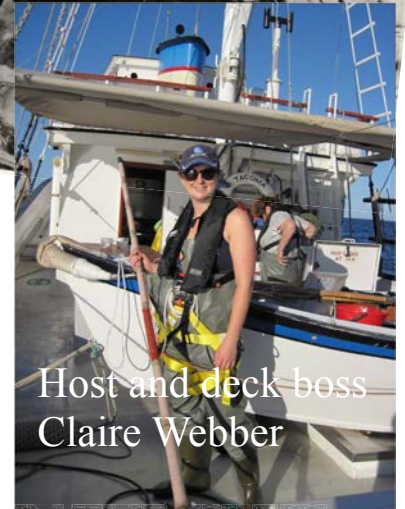
MFV Tacoma - Pioneering Tuna Clipper

The determination of three young fishermen in taking on such a large project serves as an example for all generations. The three Haldane men aged 31, 27 and 25 took 7 years to build the boat on the Moyne River at Port Fairy (Vic). After its launch in 1951, **MFV Tacoma's** maiden voyage was to Port Lincoln (SA) via Adelaide. It arrived on January 18th 1952. On board were the three Haldane brothers Bill, Alan and Hughie, their entire families and the Bellamy twins - nine adults, seven children, one watchdog and two cats. By the time they arrived in Port Lincoln there were six more aboard: the cat had kittens. **The tuna industry in Port Lincoln had begun.**

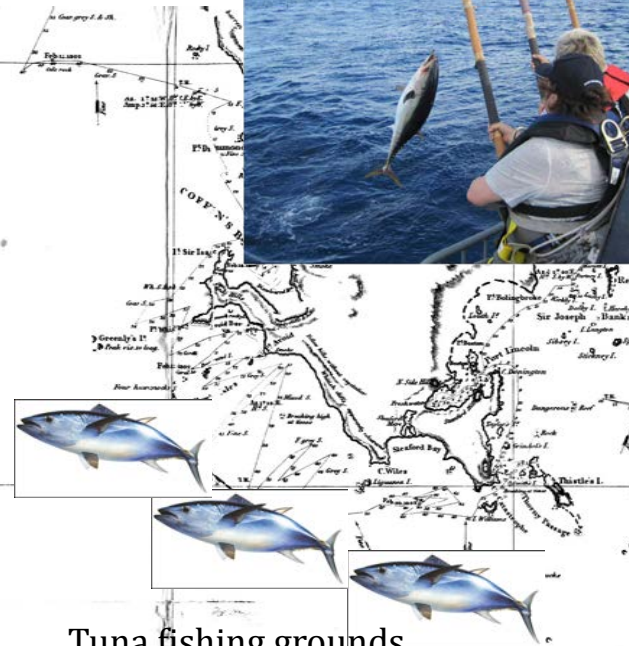
Tick your bucket list!
