
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Hello to all the friends of the TACOMA! As 2020 draws to a close we're bring you a special pre-Xmas edition of our newsletter!

It was all rather fun, the boats passed their test and we all earned a beer, me especially as I photographed it all.



ROWING TACOMA



Our rowing group started earlier this year before Covid put a stop to it, and we've had no training for sometime. We were able to get back to it and were all systems go after the 9th December, if you're keen to join us on Wednesdays at 4:30pm - 6:00pm from the Tacoma berth, please do get in touch!

TACOMA ENGINE RE-TUNE

Well winter is long gone, and there is one old lady that's glad of our grenaa motor in her 40th year and after 500,000 hours of running decided this winter that the cold was getting to her. At a temp of 11C a start-up represented a WW11 destroyer laying smoke to escape a German battleship! White smoke is seen as a good sign by those eagerly looking at the Vatican chimney but in the marina its not so pleasant. . its unburnt diesel to fix the problem timing and a re- calibration of the injectors was required. The warming weather has helped as the engine room now sits at an ambient 19C, so on start up there is a little smoke but that's normal in old diesels and she soon smooths up to a gentle purr. Long may she serve!

HISTORY

In 1907 only 1 year after the factory was founded, the first Grenaa engine was delivered to a ship.

Grenaa Diesels are developed especially for ships propulsion. This has resulted in an exceptional flexibility of operation in the complete power map. A Grenaa has a very low fuel consumption and a high torque in the complete speed range. It is virtually impossible to wear out a Grenaa Diesel. We know of Grenaa's which have been installed in up to 3 new vessels one after the other once the former ships were decommissioned. The Grenaa Diesel is a simple and well designed machine. It is difficult to damage and easy to repair. We believe that electronics have no place on a true marine engine. Your Grenaa will continue in the darkness and take you home even if all electricity on board fails.

TACOMA PORT FAIRY VISIT

It's 70 years since the Tacoma left Port Fairy why not revisit? If we do go to Port Fairy there is a lot of planning to do!

- Tides: From looking at the charts it's almost certain that we will have to make a night time entry into the Moyne River.
- Weather: The weather is an unknown factor but south-easterlies are to be expected.
- Berths: There are two possible berths, one at the wharf, and the other nearer the light house at Haldane landing.
- Accomodation: Port Fairy is a popular holiday destination so accommodation for crew is going to be at a premium.
- Preparation: Then there is the vessel preparation: painting, varnishing, and a general big make-over ... can't go back to Port Fairy looking your age! (Shame about the crew! :-))

Tacoma's Propeller Blades



'Western Flyer' - Port Townsend

Tacoma's little sister, where the project becomes the story! The Western Flyer Foundation has been undertaking a full restoration of the 'Western Flyer' in Calafornia, USA. She was famous for having carried one of America's greatest authors, John Steinbeck, on one of his voyages of discovery. Their website: www.westernflyer.org is well worth a read, and we're following progress with interest.



"Some have said they felt a boat shudder before she struck a rock, or cried when she beached and the surf poured into her," Steinbeck wrote later. "This is not mysticism, but identification; man, building this greatest and most personal of all tools, has in turn received a boat-shaped mind, and the boat, a man-shaped soul. His spirit and the tendrils of his feeling are so deep in a boat that the identification is complete."

TACOMA'S STORY

This time in "Tacoma's Story" we're talking caulking. Interesting fact: did you know that Hugh Haldane Snr was the caulker on Tacoma?

You may ask what is a caulker and what is caulking? Well, it's making the seams between the planks of a ship watertight. Caulking is a technique whereby the gaps between the planks are sealed using fibres, cord and pitch. To caulk you need cotton, some tools and lots of skill. If a vessel is poorly caulked it will either leak or it will leak a lot!


In caulking Tacoma Hugh Haldane covered almost 2kms of seam involving some 200,000 swings of the special caulking hammer. ... That is not like nailing a hook for a picture on a vertical wall! There is the lower above-head technique; the standing on scaffolding for the upper hull, and all angles in-between. But he must have done a good job as the Tacoma has only been caulked once!

The cotton used for caulking the Tacoma came from a Melbourne match making company, the Bryant and May Factory, located in the Cremorne area of Richmond in Melbourne. It is notable for its distinctive red brick buildings, and as the location for the manufacture of Australia's most popular brand of matches, 'Redheads', through much of the 20th century. Bryant and May adopted the brand name in 1946, and it is still the most popular match in the country, although now manufactured in Sweden.



PORT INCOLN 1952

2022 will be 70 years since Tacoma steamed into Boston bay to start its illustrious fishing life. To research this event we thought it would be interesting to look and see what Port Lincoln was like in 1952. Its population was some 5000 and the local rag, the Port Lincoln Times, is a treasure trove of the towns coming and goings. Here are some snippets:


