

YOUR TUNA POLING ADVENTURE

WHAT: Join the historic MFV Tacoma's annual tuna fishing adventure and experience the thrill of poling a Southern Bluefin Tuna onboard the 84ft wooden tuna clipper in the Southern Ocean & the Great Australian Bight.

Places are very limited. We're recreating a 1950s tuna fishing trip. You'll be using original fishing methods with live bait and bamboo poles. Your participation assists to maintain the vessel for future generations.

WHERE: Port Lincoln, Neptune Island, Rocky Island & Coffin Bay for 6 days & 5 nights.

WHEN: Arrive at Port Lincoln and go onboard on **Fri 2nd February 2024** for crew training, including live baiting & night fishing with lights & nets in Boston Bay. We depart for the tuna grounds early on Saturday morning, weather permitting. We'll spend the next 4 days fishing for tuna & having a great life experience. Anchorages could include Memory & Snug Coves, Whalers Bay or Greenly & Neptune Island. We'll return to Port Lincoln on **Wed 7th February**.

ACCOMMODATION: MFV Tacoma has 12 comfortable bunks, bedding, showers & a toilet.

MEALS: All provided and include memorable roasts from the AGA cooker.

CREW: There is something for everyone to do as a crew member of the
2024 Tuna Poling Adventure.

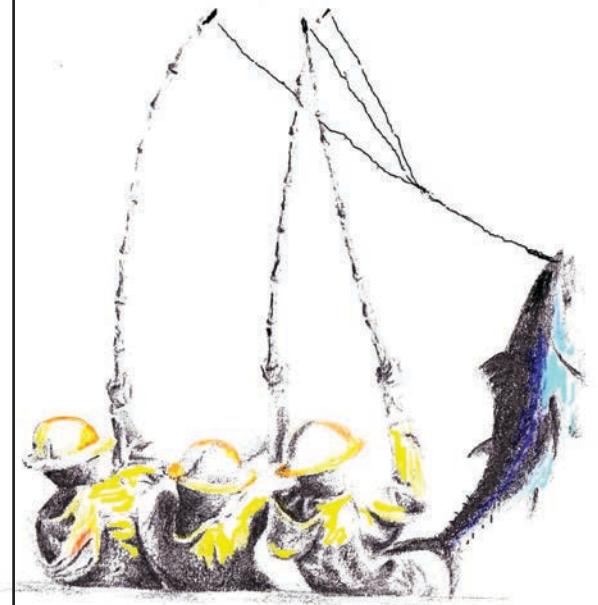

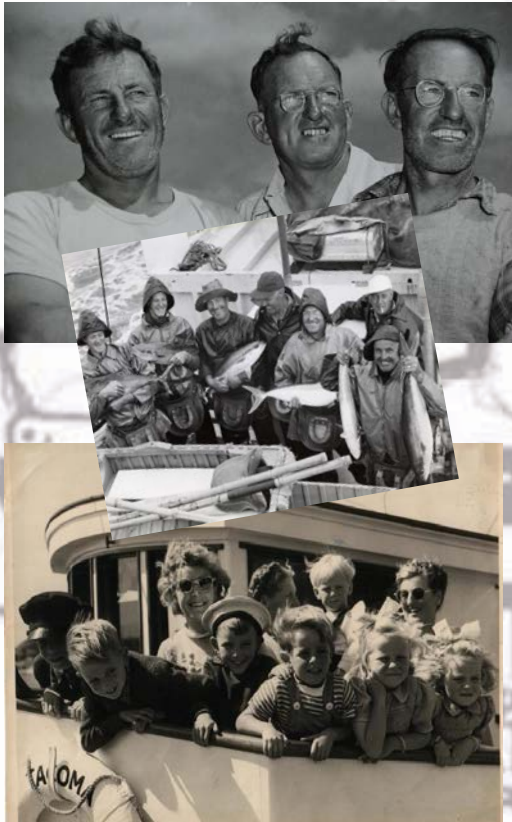
Pioneering Tuna Clipper

The determination of 3 young fishermen in taking on such a large project serves as an example for all generations. The Haldane men took 7 years to build the boat on the Moyne River at Port Fairy (Vic).

After its launch in 1951, **MFV Tacoma's** maiden voyage was to Port Lincoln (SA).

It arrived on January 18th 1952. On board were the three Haldane boat builder & fishing brothers Bill, Alan and Hughie, their entire families and the Bellamy twins, Keith and Jack – nine adults, seven children, one watchdog and a cat.

The arrival of the Tacoma heralded the start of the tuna industry in SA.
